



## New Hampshire: Why Arthritis Matters

Arthritis affects **27.6%** of the population in New Hampshire. That's **282,000** adults living with doctor-diagnosed arthritis in the state.

- There are over **54 Million** American adults with doctor diagnosed arthritis in the U.S.
- 1 in 3 veterans has arthritis, which accounts for 17.3% of the people in New Hampshire living with arthritis
- There are approximately **300,000 kids** with arthritis in the U.S. but only about **390 pediatric rheumatologists.**That's about 700 kids for each doctor.

## Over 24 million Americans experience activity limitations due to their arthritis.

- **₹ 129,000** adults in New Hampshire have activity limitations caused by arthritis
- Among all adults in New Hampshire with arthritis, 35.1% have work limitations
- Arthritis in the U.S. has an economic burden of \$304 billion made up of medical expenses and lost wages

## Adults with arthritis often have one or more chronic conditions.

- Mental Health: Anxiety and depression affect 1/3 of U.S. adults with arthritis 45 years of age or older
- **Diabetes: 52.9%** of adults in NH with diabetes also have arthritis
- Heart Disease: 56.8% of adults in NH with heart disease also have arthritis
- **▼ Obesity: 37.4%** of adults in NH who are obese also have arthritis

## You can make a difference by advocating for state and federal legislation that will help people with arthritis in New Hampshire. Legislative priorities for 2019 include:

- **Workforce:** Legislation that addresses the pediatric rheumatology workforce shortage through federal loan repayment programs
- Congressional Arthritis Caucus: Grows the bipartisan Congressional Arthritis Caucus, a forum to educate Members of Congress about the most pressing issues facing people with arthritis
