While Joie attends sessions with other youngsters her age, her family participates in educational classes about juvenile arthritis, its treatment and other related topics. "Dream, Believe, Achieve" was the theme of last year's convention.

Joie hasn't allowed arthritis to sideline her. She continues to "move" by competing in high school varsity golf, soccer, basketball, and works as a soccer referee. She also participates in "The First Tee" of Shawnee County, takes part in "Art for Arthritis" and the annual "Walk to Cure Arthritis" which raises money for the Arthritis Foundation. Twice she has cut and donated her hair to "Locks of Love".
